OPEN DOOR MINISTRY AND FISHERS OF MEN

It is amazing how the Lord provides opportunities for His people to be of service to Him. Since I was a teenager, I have had a passion for mission work. The opportunity came when I was approached by brother Demar Elam, director of Open Door Ministry, about working with him.

The main goal of Open Door Ministry is to duplicate (as closely as possible) the work of the greatest missionary the Lord's church has ever known--the apostle Paul. Like Paul, we go where the church is nonexistent, preaching the Gospel, converting souls, and establishing congregations. Since 1991, 114 congregations have been established, through this ministry, in various places around the world. Over 13,000 souls have been baptized into Jesus Christ for the remission of sins.

Most recently, a congregation was established in Villasis, a city of 50,000 people, in the province of Pangasinan, Philippines. We are thankful that the Lord blessed our efforts and the Villasis Church of Christ met for the first time on July 1, 2012. 21 Americans worked with about 40 Filipino Christians to establish this congregation, and 46 souls were added to the kingdom.

This is the type of work my family and I plan to do, on a regular basis, as we continue to labor for Him. What an opportunity! Indeed, the Lord "opens doors" for us to work and teach the saving Gospel (cf. Col. 4:3).

In addition, I have been teaching with Fishers of Men (a 12 week training course in person-to-person evangelism) part-time since 2007. We are excited about the increasing opportunities in this work. Students are grounded in God's Truth and taught how to develop interest in potential Bible studies, get appointments, and handle questions, along with many other important topics.

We need help! Here is what you can do to be a part of this work with us. (1) Pray for us. (2) Go on a campaign with us. (3) Host a Fishers of Men class. (4) Help us financially. Our need is great and it is constant. If you would like for me to visit, and tell you more, I would be delighted for the opportunity. May the Lord bless you as you labor faithfully for Him.

D radley Joseph (B. J.) Clarke was born in Canton, DIllinois, the son of Ted and Sherrie Clarke. His father is also a Gospel preacher, and educator of preachers. B. J. attended Noblesville High School (Noblesville, Indiana) and was voted by his classmates to be the male student most likely to succeed. After graduating in 1979, brother Clarke attended Freed-Hardeman College (now University) and received a B.S. degree in Bible. In 1985, he was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America. He earned an M.A. in New Testament Text from Freed-Hardeman University in 1997. In 2006, he was named an honorary alumnus of the Memphis School of Preaching.

On September 24, 1983, he married his college sweetheart, Tish, the former Tamela Suzanne Hall. They have three children: Daniel, Holly, and Michael.
