Brethren, the Lord has blessed the School with a beautiful campus and great facilities, including the stately N. B. Hardeman Library.



Now, through His marvelous grace and the vision and faith of so many, thirty-two wonderful three-bedroom apartments have been erected on campus, which are now housing over forty splendid future preachers [students] and their wives and children. How delightful to see them walk hand-in-hand to the church services, or to the Hardeman Library to do research, or to classes in the School! How delightful to see the closeness the students are building with one another, to see their children playing together! I wish you folks could be here to witness these tremendous blessings.

What is my prayer? It is that the remaining \$900,000 indebtedness [out of the original cost of \$3,500,000] can be soon paid off. Brethren, I thank you for all you have done and continue to do. You can have every confidence in our continuing, unswerving loyalty to truth. Please allow me, then, to ask you. Will you join me in my prayer for this special need? Can you help financially by specifically placing the apartments in your budget for 2008, or give a one-time contribution toward this \$900,000 goal? What a tremendous help to the cause of Christ – that is, not to owe anything for student housing! What a great saving this would be as we educate these students to preach thirty, forty, fifty, or more years! What a boost it would be to sending faithful laborers into the ripe harvest!

I pray that you can help. God bless you all.

Our purpose was to update the first video, including the change of directors, our current financial needs, and promoting student recruitment. This video has now been completed and is approximately twelve minutes in length. We are praying that it will be productive of much good. It will soon be sent out to friends of the school and will be posted on the MSOP web-site.

My thanks to Dustin Forthun and Rick Lawson for their able assistance in the production and editing of the video. Thanks also to brethren Liddell, Cates, Elkins, Clarke and Martin for their time and efforts in the making of it.

We are excited to announce we need *a* million more in one more year to eliminate the indebtedness on the apartments. [It did not take long for this sentence I wrote a few weeks ago to become outdated. Ten percent of that

figure has already been obtained, now leaving us with \$900.000 to go!] Brethren, we would like to see this goal completed by the end of 2008. We can do it with your help!

In a bulletin which I receive, I noticed that one alumnus had a fund-raising campaign within his local congregation. He told the members there that he was trying to raise \$1000 for the student apartments at MSOP and asked if they would help him reach his goal. Each week, he put the amount in the bulletin which he had raised. The amount increased gradually until the goal was finally reached. Perhaps you can do something like this where you attend.

I think it would be helpful for each alumnus to contact congregations in the area with whom they have close relations and ask them to put the fund-raising campaign for the student housing at the Memphis School of Preaching on their prayer list. Let us place this need on the hearts of our brethren who may in turn place this need before the throne of our Heavenly Father.

\$1000.00 AND WE ARE ON OUR WAY WILL YOU SEND US? Sean Hochdorf

Brethren we are only \$1000.00 a month away from completing our support. That's two congregations at \$500.00 each or ten families at \$100.00 a month, or perhaps twenty people/families at \$50.00 a month. Can you help us? Will you help us? We need to wrap up our support so we can be on our way to teaching and preaching in Arusha, Tanzania.

There are three main areas in which we hope to concentrate our efforts during our three year commitment in Tanzania: training preachers, teaching women and children, and congregational development.

Training Preachers

Currently Arusha has one of the nicest facilities among third world countries in which to train men to preach. The Andrew Connally School of Preaching was established in 2001 with the goal of training men to preach in their native country. The curriculum is similar to preaching schools in America in that it has a four year Bachelor program taught in two years. The school continues to stay at its capacity of forty students (twenty first year / twenty second year). Sean will be teaching full-time in the school of preaching. Training men in their own country produces numerous benefits: (1) Considerably less expensive than bringing men to the states (can train approximately twentymen in Africa with the funds needed to train one man in the states), (2)The temptation to stay in America, because of the luxury we enjoy, is removed, (3) There is no language or cultural barrier to overcome which makes them much more effective than a foreigner and allows them to begin preaching immediately.

Teaching Women and Children

There are endless opportunities to teach the next generation of leaders in Africa. While we struggle in the United States to reach our children, the soil is especially rich in Tanzania. Vacation Bible School type meetings can take place year round. At almost every one of these meetings, children spread the news quickly, and its not an exaggeration to say that a class that started with twenty children will end up with almost two hundred. If we reach the children, there is no telling how great the Lord's kingdom will be in the next generation. The training of children is an area in which our entire family can be involved. Our two children Race (16) and Madeleine (12) will be working alongside us in this aspect of the work.

Also of great importance is teaching women. In the African culture, women are looked upon as the laborers and the bread winners. We are not interested in Americanizing them but rather teaching them what God desires for them to be as wives and mothers. My wife, Anita, is especially talented at teaching and will be laboring diligently in this area.

Congregational Development

With the number of baptisms taking place in Arusha and the surrounding areas and the great distance between villages, there is a great need for helping these new Christians grow to maturity. For this reason we have put together a plan to do just that. Each missionary family in Arusha (6 total) will take 2 to 3 congregations and devote their efforts in working with them. This way the congregations can develop an intimate relationship with the missionary family and vice versa. By so doing, we can assess their needs, and then set out to help them develop into the Christians God desires all of us to be. Hence, men will be trained to be good leaders, husbands, etc. Women will be taught the various aspects of being a wife, mother, teacher, etc.

Where to Send Support

We sponsored are by the Kensington Woods church of Christ in Hattiesburg, Mississippi. The church in Hattiesburg is extremely involved with the work in Arusha with one elder laboring full-time with the work and several of the elders traveling each year to Arusha.
