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REX A. TURNER, JR., ENCOURAGER OF MSOP, PASSES Curtis A. Cates

On August 11, 2008, brother Rex A. Turner, Jr., faithful gospel preacher, elder in the Lord's church, and gifted president of Amridge University [formerly Alabama Christian School of Religion] died unexpectedly of a blood clot, days after brain surgery in Baptist Hospital South, Montgomery, Alabama. He was sixty-two. He was a devoted friend of the Memphis School of Preaching and of the writer. He was the son of Rex Allwin and Opal Shipp Turner.

Rex was graduated from Alabama Christian College, B.A., Troy State University, B.S. and M.S., Alabama Christian School of Religion, M.R.E. and M.Th., and the University of Alabama, Ed.D. Having preached his first sermon in his father's home congregation, Antioch in Corner, Alabama, Rex [and Barbara, his beloved wife] preached at Mt. Olive, Ozark, and Clanton, Alabama. He helped to establish the Marler Road Church of Christ, Montgomery, where he also served as an elder.

Having succeeded his father as president of Alabama Christian School of Religion in 1987, brother Rex moved the School to full regional accreditation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools [December 1989]. He expanded the programs of Bible and Religious Education [leading to the M.A., M.R.E., and M.Th.] to include programs leading to Ph.D.'s in professional counseling, in marriage and family therapy, and in Biblical studies. The growth and development of Amridge under his tenure as president has been phenomenal.


All through the years, Rex has encouraged the MSOP and our graduates. Like his father before him, he accepted two full years of college credit from the School and greatly encouraged our students to pursue advanced studies in the University. Many of our graduates have been graduated from Amridge, including brother Jerry Martin [our Dean of Students, and preacher of the Cordova Church of Christ], who has just completed his Ph.D. in Marriage and Family Therapy. Our students also for several years have been the guests of President Rex Turner, Jr., and Amridge at their Annual Mission Forum. He and Barbara additionally have shown great generosity to my family and me.

The funeral service of brother Rex took place at Leak Memory Chapel in Montgomery on August 14th. A huge crowd of friends gathered to express sympathy to sister Barbara and their family. Those participating in the service were Curtis Sampley, Blake Parker, Raymond Elliott, Roger Dill, Demar Elam, Douglas Patterson, and Curtis A. Cates [graveside remarks, Greenwood Cemetery].

Rex A. Turner, Jr., deeply loved the Lord and His church, dearly loved his family, treasured his friends, worked tirelessly in Christian education to the glory of the Lord and the advancement of His kingdom, and was characterized by humility and compassion. All of us at the Memphis School of Preaching express keep sympathy to Barbara, to their children Michael Turner, M.D., and Laina Costanza, and to their families, who have many precious memories and a great and enduring hope in Christ.

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THE GOSPEL OF GRACE (III)

ARE PEOPLE SAVED BY GRACE, LAW, FAITH AND WORKS OF OBEDIENCE IN THE CHRISTIAN DISPENSATION? INDEED!

In the New Testament, the process is reversed, but the same principles are involved and necessary. Whereas, under the Law of Moses, the sacrifices (works of obedience) produced faith, and had to be tied by faith to the coming Messiah Who would die for every man (Heb. 2:9), under the Law of Christ, the message of the cross produces **faith** in the reigning Messiah Who died for the sins of the world (John 12:32). See John 8:24, 21; Mark 16:16. Faith must produce **works** of obedience. Faith, minus works, is "dead faith" (Jam. 2:20-26). Faith without works is as lifeless as a corpse; thus, cannot save.

One who denies the necessity of obedience to the commands of Christ flies into the face of, and denies, such clear passages as Matthew 7:21-23; Luke 6:46; John 14:15; Acts 2:26-41; Hebrews 5:8-9; John 12:48; Philippians 2:12; et al. Faith which obeys enables God's grace to flow to the sinner. But, denominational preachers say, "Trust God and do nothing; if you have to obey ('work'), then you take the grace out of it." They have no exhibition of faith. But, Bible belief is trust conjoined with, combined with, obedience (see the earlier discussion on John 3:16).

Trust is expressed in action; if not, it is not Bible faith. No blessing is received anywhere in the Bible until faith expresses itself vividly. Note James 2:18, where it is clear that one must **show** his faith by works, else it is not saving, Biblical faith. Faith must be shown, visible, demonstrated; it can be seen. Bible faith is an expression of one's trust in God, **in the manner directed** by God.

How did the Israelites show their trust and thus conquer Canaan (cross over Jordan on dry land, capture the city of Jericho)? The very **moment** they trusted God, according to "faith only"/"grace only" doctrine, the two to three million Israelites all should have been over in Canaan, and should have been in possession of Jericho with the walls having fallen ["He that hath ears to hear, let him hear."]

The very minute they responded, "We trust thee," then the receiving of God's "gift" should have been **immediate**; but that is not the way it happened: "By faith they passed through the Red sea as by dry land" to receive the gift (Heb. 11:29); "By faith the walls of Jericho fell down, **after** they had been compassed about for seven days" (v. 30).

Was Rahab saved before, or after, she hid the spies, hung out the scarlet cord, and stayed in her house (v. 31)? Salvation is by faith that expresses itself in obeying any direction God commands; never is it Bible faith otherwise. Why is such obedience never meritorious? It is because by trusting in God,

and by that trust's expressing itself as God directs, it is never a work of merit. Trust in God takes away the merit.

Scriptural obedience is but an expression of one's trust. That is why obedience (even to Christ's commands) must never be separated from trust, faith in the cross, because if it were separated from faith, and if it brought any blessing through it, then that would become action that had merit. It would become legalism (the attempt to be saved by obedience alone, apart from trust in the redeeming blood of Christ).

Thus, scriptural, saving trust that is expressed in obedience enables grace to provide the blessing, and therefore is not meritorious. We are saved also by **law**, the system of faith, the scheme of redemption, the law of Christ. Some attempt to affirm that, in the Christian Dispensation, we are "saved by grace, not by law or by law-keeping"; even some of our "brethren" have attempted to promote this sectarian falsehood, a gross misapplication of John 1:17 and other passages which teach we are not saved by the Law of Moses today.

Of course, this is a blatant denial of such clear passages as Isaiah 2:2-4; Romans 8:1-2; 1 Corinthians 9:21; Galatians 6:2; James 1:22-25; 2:8, 12; et al. The Law of Christ is a law of faith, just as was the Law of Moses; had the Law of Moses been a law of works, and had salvation been through works alone (apart from faith), then Christ would not have had to die; we would be saved by a law of works, the same way, today. A law of works has **never** saved; however, that is **not** to say that one is saved apart from obedience—far from it!

Now, which element can one leave out and still be saved? Can grace be omitted? Can we save ourselves? Can one scripturally affirm that there is no plan or pattern (law) given by God for our lives? Can we be saved without trust in Christ? If so, why would one "call" upon Him (Rom. 10:13-17)? Can one reject submitting to the commands of Christ and obedience from a heart of love, and still demonstrate his trust? To leave out even one of these necessary ingredients of salvation is folly!

CONCLUSION

Man cannot save himself. Never in history has anyone received God's blessings apart from grace, law, faith, and works. Paul stated, therefore, "For this cause it is of faith, that it may be according to grace" (Rom. 4:16). The Holy Bible is a book of tremendous harmony and consistency. Submit your life to the law of Christ by the obedience of faith in repenting of sin, confessing Christ as God's Son, and being baptized into Christ, thus trusting and obeying for remission of sins, saved by God's "amazing grace."
